Dear Friends of MRC.

As we reflect on Mountain Resource Center's impact over the last year, we are inspired by the unwavering dedication of our staff & volunteers, and buoyed by the generosity and compassion of our partners and donors.

In the face of the evolving challenges posed by the ongoing pandemic and economic fluctuations, we have witnessed an unprecedented scale of need among our clients. We learned that the primary causes of stress that brought a family through our doors were financial and food insecurity concerns. Mountain Resource Center has risen to address these expanded needs. Our commitment is evident in the tangible impact of our efforts. We increased the number of new households that we served by over 60% and doubled the amount of food distributed to over 300,000 pounds.

We have learned the importance of listening intently to our community. Through surveys, advisory committees, community events, and open dialogue, we have shaped our programming to align with the needs of those we serve. Initiatives such as introducing a mobile dental clinic, launching a successful free summer camp for children ages 6-10, and establishing a job training program exemplify our responsiveness to the community's voice.

Looking ahead, we are poised to launch a low-cost preschool initiative in the Conifer area, responding directly to the expressed demand for affordable, quality preschool programming. This endeavor, set to commence in the fall of 2024, will add a valuable dimension to our suite of services, further enriching the lives of those we support. We look forward to sharing more about this exciting and bold new vision in the coming months.

We will continue to nourish, connect, and empower our families as we have for 33 years, and we eagerly anticipate the journey ahead. We are grateful for the ways each of you have poured your support into our mission. This Impact Report serves as a testament to what we can all do when we come together.

Basic Needs Assistance provides clients with emergency financial assistance for rent/mortgage and utilities, mental health resources, and case management.


Veterans Support provides a single point of contact model that offers advocacy, case management and support, basic needs assistance, transportation, coverage of mental health expenses, and referrals to veteran-specific resources and community events.

Community Health aims to foster wellness through outreach, engagement, and public policy advocacy. Programs address food insecurity through MRC's onsite food pantry, an established mobile food pantry, and partnerships with local schools. Programs equip community members with healthy lifestyle skills through nutrition education and cooking classes.

Family Education provides early childhood education learning opportunities year-round, including Incredible Years Parent and Child curriculum, Circle of Parents support group, Summer Camp, and outreach events.

Mountain Resource Center's Resale Store is a retail second-hand store that promotes sustainability and provides vouchers to clients for free clothing, kitchen items, and other needed goods.






